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## Theatres fit for the **future**



The Watermill is a Grade II listed heritage asset which was converted into a repertory theatre in 1967. It has produced a number of shows and supports youth theatre and educational opportunities. It is therefore an important and valued cultural asset for the local area, also drawing in visitors from further afield. Paragraph 97 of the NPPF (2023) seeks planning decisions to plan positively for facilities of this nature.

The rural location of the Watermill means that much of its audience, performer and staff travel will be by private vehicle. We welcome this proposal as it will help promote more sustainable travel options and the reduction of carbon emissions through supporting electric vehicles. The charging points are modest in scale but are in any case to be located within the car park in a location which is less sensitive in heritage terms. Nonetheless with reference to paragraph 208 of the NPPF we consider these installations to constitute a public benefit.

We therefore support the granting of planning permission.
